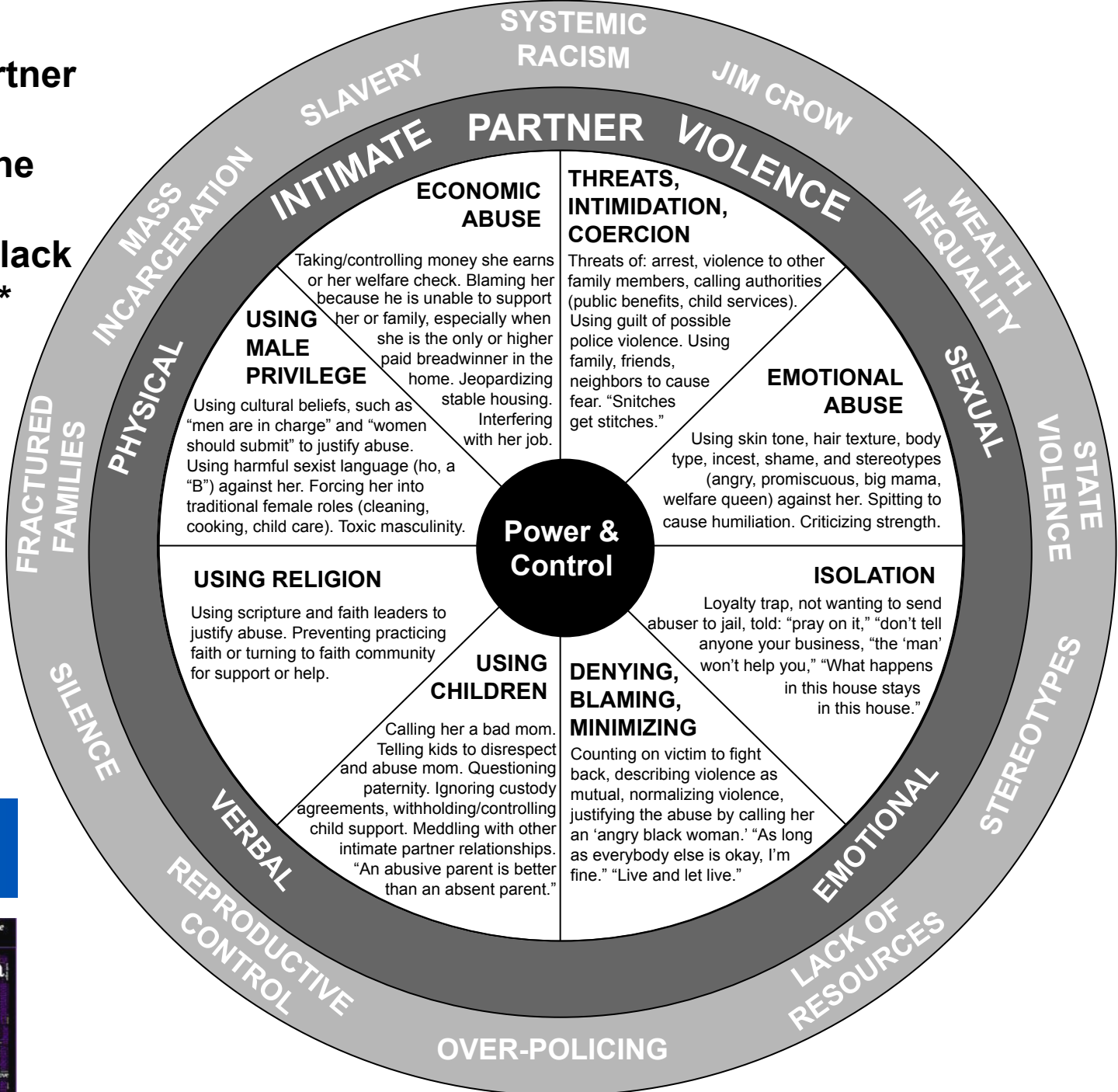


Wheel of Intimate Partner Power and Control in the African American/Black Community*



KEY

■ The outer circle represents the structural societal level factors that most impact the African American/Black community in regards to intimate partner violence. These terms further reflect how historical trauma manifests in the community today.

■ The middle circle represents types of violence used by the batterer to reinforce control over their partner.

□ The inner spokes represent specific examples of how batterers exercise coercive control.
